FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

Silent night, holy night!

And while they were there [in Bethlehem], the time came for Mary to be delivered. And she gave birth to her first-born son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn. — Luke 2:4-7

The Incarnation and the birth of Jesus are, as St. Ignatius of Antioch writes, "mysteries to be loudly proclaimed; yet which were accomplished in the silence of God." The birth of the Savior takes place in the stillness of the night, announced by the angels only to some shepherds keeping watch over their flocks.

Bishop Ottokar Prohaszka, in his Mediations on the Gospels, says:

Our Lady was not admitted into the inn, because Bethlehem was full — full of foreigners and visitors, full of gossip and clamor. There was no room for her. (Our hearts, too, can be like Bethlehem, with no room in them for God.) Mary, in the tranquility and solitude of the stable, is conscious that her soul has been placed here in the darkness of the world to light up Jesus' path. The night is silent as her joy wells irresistibly upward.

Many commentators emphasize the *poverty* of the circumstances of our Lord's birth. They are not wrong, but this was a poverty of simplicity, not of squalor. In the stable at Bethlehem everything is exactly as it should be. Mary looks around at her humble surroundings "with the eyes of the mother of God. In what glorious light they must have appeared to her. It was the light of her own sweet happiness. Our Lady rejoices in this, just as God takes pleasure in the humble little churches where simple people kneel at prayer. Here is poverty, and glowing fervor."

Cardinal Robert Sarah, in his recent book, 'The Power of Silence', quotes Pope John Paul II:

Mary's example enables the Church to better appreciate the value of silence. Mary's silence is a wise capacity for embracing in a single gaze of faith the mystery of the Word made man. It is this ability to meditate on the mystery of Christ that Mary passes on to believers. In a noisy world filled with messages of all kinds, her witness enables us to appreciate a spiritually rich silence which fosters a contemplative spirit.

Cardinal Sarah adds: "In my country, at the end of the daily Rosary, we often sing this hymn to Mary: 'May your sweet presence enlighten us forever, O Virgin of silence. Give us your great peace'."

In the words of Bishop Prohaszka: "Let us ask Our Lady to grant us a share in her Christmas happiness, and to give us light, so that we too may gaze upon God with the eyes of love and of faith."

May God richly bless you this Christmas!
