FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

Peace on earth, good-will to men.

I heard the bells on Christmas day their old familiar carols play, and mild and sweet the words repeat: "Of peace on earth, good-will to men!" — Longfellow

These are the first words of a familiar carol, taken from a poem written during the American Civil War. The tragedy of that war is reflected in the later verses:

Then from each black, accursed mouth, the cannon thundered in the South, and with the sound the carols drowned: "Of peace on earth, good-will to men!"

And in despair I bowed my head; "There is no peace on earth," I said; "for hate is strong, and mocks the song: Of peace on earth, good-will to men!"

As I write this, the world is once again caught up in the calamity of war. The conflict in Ukraine is now approaching its third year, and there is no end yet in sight for Israel's war against Hamas. And that is not taking account of the many wars that are not covered by the main stream media. Indeed, 'there is no peace on earth, for hate is strong.'

The coming of the Messiah, two thousand years ago, was expected to usher in a new age of peace and prosperity. The people of Judah at that time were looking for liberation from Roman rule and the establishment of an independent nation state as it once existed under King David.

The Messiah *did* come, but the religious authorities handed him over to be killed. Three decades later the Israelites revolted, the Romans besieged Jerusalem, and the Temple was destroyed. The Jewish historian Josephus was a witness to these events: "No destruction ever wrought by God or man approached the wholesale carnage of this war."

When Jesus was entering Jerusalem for the Passover "he wept over it, saying, "If you, even you, had only recognized on this day the things that make for peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes. Indeed, the days will come upon you, when your enemies will set up ramparts around you and surround you, and hem you in on every side. They not leave within you one stone upon another; because you did not recognize the time of your visitation from God."

This is a matter of somber reflection as we enter into a new year, which ought to be a time of renewed hope. The Messiah did come with the message of 'peace on earth and good-will to men.' That is the message of the Gospel, the 'good news' of Jesus Christ. The tragedy is that this message has so often been rejected. As St. John says, "The light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil."

In the final verse of his poem, Longfellow expresses the hope for a return to peace after the storm of war:

Then pealed the bells more loud and deep: "God is not dead, nor doth He sleep; the Wrong shall fail, the Right prevail, with peace on earth, good-will to men."
