FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

One of these things is not like the others

The path belonging to the Church circumscribes the whole world, as possessing the sure tradition from the Apostles, and gives unto us to see that the faith of all is one and the same, since all receive one and the same God the Father. — St. Irenaeus

One time, when my niece was little, I was helping her do a jigsaw puzzle. Some pieces just did not seem to fit. I soon realized that there were pieces from two different puzzles mixed together in the same box. It was necessary to sort out the 'bad' pieces before we could complete the picture. It is the same with 'Catholic' books.

In last Sunday's bulletin I wrote about visiting a wonderful used-book shop. The 'Christianity' section was jam-packed. Most of the books were obviously 'dreck' (worthless) but others were not so easy to categorize.

For example, there was a big thick book, authored by a priest-professor at a famous American Catholic University, with the promising title, *Catholicism*. A blurb on the back cover lauded it as "the clearest and most competent guide in the English language to the Catholic Church's origins, teaching, traditions, and developments." I worked my way through a good part of it before tossing into the recycle bin, saying "This is not Catholic!"

On the other hand, the 'Image' series of paperbacks, published in the 1950s and '60s, lived up to their billing — 'making the world's finest Catholic literature available to all.' The series includes the works of St. Augustine, Francis de Sales, Teresa of Avila, John of the Cross, John Henry Newman, and many others. These sturdy paperbacks still have an honored place on my own bookshelves.

The publishing industry is continually churning out 'Christian' books. Much of it would be more honestly labeled '*anti*-Christian.' But there are also some excellent Catholic publishers: Ignatius Press, Sophia Institute Press, Angelico Press, and others. I doubt that any recently published book will make it onto a list of 'classics,' with the possible exception of Raymond Arroyo's biography of Mother Angelica. We cannot expect someone of the stature of St. Augustine or Teresa of Avila to happen along in every generation. That said, good books are still being published. I have been impressed by the writings of Cardinal Robert Sarah and Bishop Athanasius Schneider.

The basic criterion for judging a 'Catholic' book is whether it is consistent with what you already know to be true. It is like they sang on Sesame Street: "One of these things is not like the other; one of these things just doesn't belong. Can you guess which thing is not like the others before I finish my song?"

Like a piece of a jigsaw puzzle, a good Catholic book not only fits into the overall picture but extends it.
